



VICTORY OVER HATE

September 2017

Joseph – the Biblical character himself, son of Jacob and Rachel – preached at Calvary on Sunday, August 13. You could say that Joseph was the victim of a hate group. Only the hate group was his own family – his brothers, jealous of their father’s favoritism towards him. Ready to murder him, instead they sold him to traders who then sold him as a slave in Egypt. Fast forwarding through the story, Joseph rose from a slave to becoming Pharaoh’s right-hand man. He administered the entire Egyptian economy through years of famine. When the famine reached Canaan where his father and brothers still lived, his brothers traveled to Egypt to buy food from Joseph. But they didn’t recognize him. On the second such visit, Joseph revealed his identity to them and extended his forgiveness.

Joseph perceived divine plans and purposes fulfilled even through the painful events in his life of betrayal and abandonment by his own family. He perceived that it wasn’t entirely by accident that he ended up in his powerful position so that he could preserve life for Egypt and the surrounding nations during a prolonged famine; and, in particular, so that he could provide for his own family and allow the future people of Israel to come in existence. Perceiving this divine presence at work, he says to his brothers... *it was not you who sent me here, but God.* And later, after Jacob dies and his brothers again fear revenge from Joseph, he reassures them of his forgiveness and declares, *Even though you intended to do harm to me, God intended it for good.*

I don’t believe that terrible things that happen in the world and in our personal lives are “God’s will.” I don’t believe that God causes atrocities for some reason or to create some meaning. And I



don’t believe that’s how we should understand Joseph’s words. Danish philosopher, Soren Kierkegaard, wrote, “Life can only be understood backwards, but it must be lived forward.” In Joseph’s story, it was some 20 years from the time of his betrayal by family to his reconciliation with them. Looking back on his betrayal, he perceived something more than just their evil intent and what they did to him.

There’s nothing automatic about such perception. Painful, tragic life experiences can deepen faith, or destroy it. They can create character, or beget bitterness. Some marriages/partnerships are strengthened by walking

through crisis, and some collapse.

Paul wrote to the Romans, *In all things God works for good for those who love God...* (8:28) I don’t like the translation, *All things work together for good...* because terrible things don’t automatically work for good. But I believe there is sometimes a truth to be perceived about the power of divine grace to bring some kind of good out of what only seems evil – things we can’t understand, don’t have to “explain”, and never have to defend as being “God’s will”.

One of our adult chaperones on our recent youth mission trip to Montana gave me the Spring 2017 issue of *Intelligence Report*, the Southern Poverty Law Center’s (SPLC) magazine. I read it on the train ride home. It’s subtitled, “The Year in Hate and Extremism”.

By now you may have seen information in that magazine quoted by news sources since the events in Charlottesville the second weekend in August. The SPLC lists 917 active hate groups in the United States in 2016. This is double the number

CHURCH COUNCIL UPDATE

At our August Council meeting, Joani Moberg briefed us on the work of the Facilities Task Force. Given the important issues the Task Force is exploring, we plan to make this a regular part of our monthly Council meetings. We are grateful for Joani's leadership and all those volunteering on the Task Force.

We also heard a presentation by our Office Administrator, Kurt Posz, who has completed a detailed analysis of the building usage. One of the key things we are learning is that Calvary incurs building-related expenses far above the rent we receive from Urban Arts Academy (UAA). With the blessing of the Council, Pastor Bruce has initiated conversations with UAA leadership to inform them about this situation. As a next step, Calvary's Executive Committee will meet with UAA Executive Committee in early September to begin brainstorming solutions.

Treasurer Tom Johnson laid out the schedule for preparing the 2018 budget over the coming months. He will be leading a discussion of Calvary's budget during the adult education hour on Sunday October 1, so we hope you can attend that to learn more.

The Generosity Team is getting ready to launch our "Journey to Generosity" this fall. As part of this effort, Pastor Bruce has challenged the Council to be bolder in our leadership around giving. He presented anonymous data showing the Council's giving in 2016 and estimated giving for 2017. Collectively, we increased our giving by 38%. As leaders of the Congregation we will be making our estimate of 2018 giving by the end of September, so it will be announced prior to Commitment Sunday, which will be October 15.

Please join us in offering prayers for our Call Committee as they begin interviewing six candidates for Pastor over the coming days.

in 1999, but below the peak of 1,018 in 2011. (This list doesn't include activism that takes place only online by individuals or groups which is a growing phenomenon among extremists.) Of these 917, the group breakdown is as follows: 130 Ku Klux Klan; 99 Neo-Nazi; 100 White Nationalist; 78 Racist Skinhead; 21 Christian Identity; 43 Neo-Confederate; 193 Black Separatist; 52 Anti-LGBT; 101 Anti-Muslim; 100 General Hate.

Heather Heyer was killed in Charlottesville and many were injured as a young man affiliated with some hate group drove a car into a crowd of counter-protesters. Two state troopers also died when their helicopter crashed while monitoring the violence. Thirteen were killed on August 17 when an apparent ISIS-affiliated driver of a van drove into a crowd in Barcelona. The Dar Al Farooq Islamic Center in Bloomington was firebombed on August 5. Fortunately no one was hurt.

Terrible atrocities. Evil acts. And we all know there will be more. People will continue to commit evil deeds out of their own particular fears, hatreds and twisted ideologies. And they will win battles. But when we are tempted to think that evil is winning the day, we need to remember the gospel. We need to remember that that love of God revealed in Jesus Christ will eventually win the war against hate.

In WWII, the original Nazis won many battles. But they lost the war. But the gospel's victory will not come about

by the power of American military might. It will come by the triumph of God's love over all the hatred and evil deeds that we humans are capable of. As Jesus says in Matthew 15, *What comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder...*

Heather Heyer's mother, Susan Bro, has said she hopes some good would come out of her daughter's death. She said that what they did to her has already magnified what she stood for. What did she stand for? Anti-hate. Pro-love.

The gospel of Jesus Christ, according to my theology, declares that God's love is bigger than even the worst tragedies and evil atrocities that flow from hate-filled human hearts. A Lutheran “theology of the cross” perceives the presence of God even amidst human acts of hate.

What is the gospel? It's the message that after the Roman execution of that peasant, Jewish preacher – Jesus of Nazareth – there was a resurrection. Out of the ashes of death and grief, new life will emerge... again and again and again.

As people of faith, let's not forget the ultimate triumph of God's love and resurrection power. Let's remember who will get the last word.
